Our People

Our volunteers, staff and Board members have made this another busy and productive winter for the Charlotte County Archives. Our Archives Manager Heather Wilson has been assisted almost full time by Keith McKnight supported by grants from Young Canada Works, Canada Summer Jobs, and the GNB Community Museums Summer Employment Program. Our core volunteer groups like the photo ladies and Board members have worked right through the pandemic, working in small "bubbles" or resorting to Zoom when unable to meet in person.



But this year we are having to say sad farewells to two board stalwarts. Robin Burton relinquished her role as Treasurer and *de facto* Office Manager in March, leaving a trail of accomplishments behind her. Without her four years of near full-time efforts under extraordinarily difficult circumstances, we could not have made the progress that we have and for this we and the community owe her a great deal of appreciation. We are deeply in her debt.

Shirley Brinkhurst will also be retiring from

the Board after six years of dedicated service. Shirley has worked tirelessly behind the scenes, helping sort and catalog numerous collections and will be remembered by many children for her "Dress Up" historic costume events with costumes she made beautifully herself. Almost singlehandedly, she cleared



out the scattered contents of the loft in the Old Jail, running up and down perilous twisty narrow stairs more reminiscent of a ship's ladder than any building. She has been a tireless worker for the Archives over the years and we greatly appreciate her support.

Strategic Planning

Robin's last major contribution to the Board was promoting and arranging for the preparation of our strategic planning exercise, which was designed to guide us as we face the next several years. In March our Board Members and staff members met to review, discuss, challenge, and agree on a strategic plan to help guide the Charlotte County Archives' future, under the guidance of Michael McLean with funding from the **GNB** Museum Professional and Organizational Development Grant. Our new five-year Strategic Plan will move the Archives forward and propel growth in many areas. This will be released at the AGM on June 9th and will act as the basis for our annual work plans to help us reach our new goals by 2027.

Unpacking Charlotte County

The Education Committee at the Archives has been busy preparing two exciting projects for families, students, and teachers. This two-pronged initiative will include an online guide on our website that encourages participants to explore Charlotte County and reflect on what they see. The online guide will lead you to travel throughout the County to discover the history and people in it. Learn about historic homes and buildings; the ocean floor and tides; famous people; the natural world and more. As you travel, use your imagination to create art, build constructions, write about your trip, draw or paint pictures, and play games. The second is a series of archival postcards depicting 10 locations across the County in an attractive folder (soon to be made available to schools and for purchase at the Old Jail), again with encouragement to check out the locations and mail the postcards to loved ones near and far or back to the Archives to make you part of the history of the County.



Help us record the County's stories.

We need your help creating Charlotte County oral histories Do you know someone with stories to tell? Will you help record them and preserve them? We have everything you need to carry out video interviews with willing friends or acquaintances, including equipment and self-help guidelines. Written guidelines are supported with a how-to video — all uploaded to a specially created interactive section on the CC Archives website. (https://ccarchives.ca/oral-histories/) From this site, you can download the guidelines and upload the results of your own interviewing efforts.

The launch of our Oral Histories program was a significant part of the \$25,000 grant we received from the Federal government for the "Seniors Preserving Memories in Charlotte County" project funded by the Canada New Horizons for Seniors Program March 2020 – 2022. The Oral Histories component supported the preparation of ten "Archives Backpacks" with basic equipment and information needed to carry out well-documented interviews. These backpacks include video cameras, voice recorders, and ancillary equipment for seniors to undertake an oral histories collection program in our communities.

The backpacks are now available on loan and we welcome expressions of interest in carrying out oral history collection locally. Please contact Heather Wilson at the Archives if you would like to be a volunteer

interviewer and help us record and preserve local social histories and individual memories.



Remembering Donna Muir, dedicated Charlotte County Archives Chair

It is with appreciation that we mark the recent death of Donna Muir, Chair of the Charlotte County Archives Board from 2011 to 2017. During her time as Chair, the Board made much progress laying the legal basis of the Corporation through the creation of by-laws and policies working with Archives Manager Janice Fairney. Donna also enrolled a County-wide team of volunteers to help with Archives activities. As our Curator of Photographs Irene Scarratt says, "Because of her rural connections, Donna was able to involve other interested individuals in the whole of Charlotte County and we valued her professionalism and contributions to the continuity of the CCA."

Our retired Secretary Jane Garnett adds, "As a Board member, I was immediately impressed with Donna's intelligence, knowledge of procedure, and organizational skills. As Board Chair, she was well prepared, and presided over meetings with authority, skill, and enthusiasm. I missed her when she retired from the Archives Board, and feel her contributions were inestimable."

Past Board member Barry Murray continued, "Donna saw the great possibilities in the holdings at the Archives and recognized that they needed to be shared with everyone possible. And she knew that the way to accomplish these goals was through community engagement." Donna — a "Baysider" — saw the rural needs that could be met by the Archives and worked diligently to make things inclusive. She completed her own family genealogy and it is fitting that her final resting spot is the Sandy Point Cemetery, just across the road from the Muir Family Farm."


Jeff Holmes tells the illustrated story of HMS Transportation, owned by Conleys Lobsters, Charlie Taylor, and himself in succession.
