Thanks to a grant from the Council of Archives New Brunswick, Mary Myers undertook a project to improve access to one of our most significant groups of materials, the fonds of prominent 19th century lawyer and politician B. R. Stevenson. As Mary writes, "Benjamin R. Stevenson was a leading figure in the development of development of the infrastructure in the Charlotte County area of New Brunswick. His extensive notes and documents bring together the history of how Charlotte County and St. Andrews unfolded to be a very important part of the history of New Brunswick both in industry and culturally. This collection also tells the story of day-to-day life living in that era." Through detailed work with over 7 metres of Stevenson's correspondence, records, court papers, invoices, legal documents and more, Mary's detailed cataloguing deepens our understanding of the contents of this important fonds, improving the ability for researchers to mine the rich resource.



From October to January, Kezah Halstead, a Grade 12 student from Sir James Dunn Academy, joined us each morning for a co-op placement, creating engaging outreach content from our holdings. Says Kezah: "These four months have been wonderful. At the Archives, it was like a break from school – I was given the freedom to pursue topics that interested me rather than follow a curriculum out of a textbook. Because of this experience, my passion for history is increased, and I have a good idea of what I want to do in the future." Kezah's work culminated in an interactive digital "walking tour" sharing the stories of historic buildings around St. Andrews, via the website Historypin. Enjoy here:

In our main winter outreach event, we were delighted to host film scholar Dr. Jennifer VanderBurgh for an online lecture about mid-twentieth century documentary filmmaker Margaret Perry, whom we only recently identified as having been born in Charlotte County. VanderBurgh, a professor at St. Mary's University, highlighted Perry's early development as a filmmaker in New Brunswick, where she honed her craft before embarking on a career as the heart of the Nova Scotia Film Bureau. The fascinating lecture spurred coverage from both the *St. Croix Courier* and CBC New Brunswick, bringing renewed attention to Perry's local roots. St. Andrews in '50s technicolour with Colin Mundy films



In 1954, Colin Mundy came to St. Andrews N.B. from New Zealand and stayed for several years. During that time, he shot a lot of film, which he later digitized and to which he added a soundtrack. His films offer a unique account of his life in mid-1950s St. Andrews. The Preview teaser offers glimpses of the films in this collection. Activities in St. Andrews on Christmaas Day 1954, building of a pre-cut Styleliner house, opening of the Vincent Massey High School in 1956, a Lobster Parade, renovating the Dr. Gove house on Parr Street, growing vegetables on the O'Neill farm, and a trip to PEI on the Ferry are

among the glimpses of mid-century life he captured on these films reconstituted by Franklin Cardy for Charlotte County Archives in 2023. All can be viewed from the following links:

Paying It Forward by Giving Back

Dr. Mary Conley was brought up in St. Andrews and, although living in Victoria, still considers it her home. Her ancestors fought in the American Revolution and were given a land grant in New Brunswick where, for more than 50 years, Conley's Lobsters was a driving economic force in St. Andrews. Mary continues to support this community through generous donations to Ministers Island and the Charlotte County Archives, which has been the recipient of \$35,000 in operating funds. We are incredibly appreciative of her contributions.

As a student at UNB, Mary received scholarships and decided to repay the university for their generosity by establishing a scholarship. On May 17, 2023, she will receive an honorary doctorate of science. After graduating and attending medical school at UBC, she worked as a family doctor and political activist for women's health in Victoria, where she received the Woman of Distinction Award

for Health for her volunteer service to the community; was voted as a leader by her peers at UBC for her work in educating interns about contraception; and won the Reproductive Health Award from The Canadian Federation of Medical Women. Teaching has always been one of her passions.

Dr. Conley is also an accomplished artist, winning many accolades and awards for her realistic paintings. She participates in juried shows both locally and in the USA and has exhibited paintings, pastels, handmade books, and papier maché sculptures. Since retirement, she has written six books, two of which she researched through the Charlotte County Archives and two that she also illustrated. The latest, *The Artistry of Art Deco*, won the Hallmark Heritage Award in 2020. Sunbury Shores will host an exhibit of Mary's handmade 3D and pop-up books from May 19 to June 9, 2023.
