
Summer students

DID YOU KNOW?

In the spring of 1856, a young New Brunswick soldier named Fred W. Parker gathered flowers in Crimea, immediately after the end of the Crimean War, and pressed them into a book to send home to his mother in St. Andrews.





Over forty 170-year-old flowers are exquisitely preserved in an album signed "with Freddy's love," each with a hand-written caption of the location it was picked. One flower comes from the Valley of Death, as referenced in Tennyson's famous poem "The Charge of the Light Brigade," while Fred picked another from the cemetery of the Light Brigade itself.





This remarkable object testifies to the fact that even this corner of Charlotte County was embedded in the international relations of the British Empire, including its conflicts. Fred's flowers add a deeply personal touch, particularly resonant in these days of continued strife in that same Ukrainian landscape.

PRESERVING YOUR PHOTOS' STORIES

To you, your most treasured photos are worth thousands of words. That laughing child is your beloved niece, moments after she stole your glasses; that's your house on the first day after you signed the papers to make it your home. You know the years, the places, the names.

What happens to those stories, later? Have you taken care to store your photos in albums, to back-up and print the digital? Your camera embeds basic metadata, the date, potentially the place – make sure this information remains. Don't rely on software to identify the faces. These are the details that make photos more than images.



This image, from our collection, shows a group of young hockey players. A nice enough photo – but add the caption, "Southern N.B. Champions," the date, 1935, the detail that this was the hockey team of the Charlotte County Grammar School. Add the names—Joe Gibson, Lester Holmes, Vernon Stinson—and the nicknames: Allison (Pickle) McNichol, Raymond (Snowball) McQuoid. Add, finally, the poignant notes added after three of these names: "RCAF- Killed." No longer a simple image of a school team, but a poignant capture of youth still innocent of the looming shadow of war.

Little as we like to imagine it, many of our photos end up in other hands. Descendants who've forgotten the faces, collectors at garage sales, archivists. Here is what you can do for those your photos may someday interest. Leave traces of the stories. Write on your prints: names, dates, places. Tag and caption your digital images. A few words could ensure your photos' worth.
